
had stiff competition from older students for

Secondary Schools' tournament week saw Timaru Girls' High School hockey head to Invercargill to compete in the Audrey Timlin Memorial Trophy.

After coming off one of the most successful seasons in years in the local competition, finishing 3rd in the combined Mid/South Canterbury Senior Women's Grade, Timaru Girls' went to Invercargill with renewed confidence.

On day one Timaru Girls' swept aside Cashmere High and Avonside Girls' from Christchurch in pool play before coming up against one of the local teams Gore High School going down 3-1. The loss from that game put pressure on TGHS and needed to beat local favourites Southland Girls' High School that night to make it through to the semi-finals, the girls came out firing to take the game 4-2 to move through to the semi-finals.

Semi-final day the TGHS girls came out firing against St Mary's College from Auckland and put three unanswered goals in the back of the

net before half time and finished off the game with their fourth unanswered goal to march in to the final against Queen Margaret College from Wellington.

The final saw the worst conditions of the week with rain, hail and sleet covering the turf with play suspended for 10 minutes due to the intense hail. Although the girls succumbed in the final 3-1 they gave it their all in trying conditions which at times were unplayable.

The top two teams from Audrey Timlin earn a place in the top tournament in 2016 against the top 32 teams from throughout New Zealand.
